The Story of Alexander Cemetery

Alexander Cemetery acquired its name from the church located on the beautiful sand hill in what is now known as the Tabor community. The church was named for Reverend Robert Alexander, a circuit rider who organized the church at this site in 1854 in a log cabin school house located just outside the present cemetery grounds near the cemetery's east corner. The first church building was built in 1856. No specific mention was made of the cemetery in the deed records, but the cemetery is situated on the church grounds. Residents of the area gradually started burying their families here instead of maintaining a family cemetery on their own property. The cemetery is only a few feet from the present church building, all of which is approximately nine miles north of Bryan, Texas, and one mile off F.M. State Highway 974.

The ten acre tract of land belonging to the church is located on a hill which was the center of what was then known as the Alexander community, now the Tabor community. For many years there was also a school, located on the ten acres given to the church. The area was to become later identified as part of the Tabor community when the Alexander school was consolidated with the Tabor school, just 3 miles north. Alexander community eventually lost its identity as a community with the relocation of the school.

It is thought the first person to be buried in the cemetery was a small child whose surname was Whitley. The child was a great niece of E. W. Thompson, a carpenter and farmer, who built the casket of wood, lined it with white cloth and, with the help of a few friends, buried the child near the location for a proposed church building. The grave was fenced but no permanent headstone was provided, thus the grave was eventually lost. The first burial was around 1854, the same year the first church services were conducted by Reverend Alexander in the school building.

Many years later, in 1901, E. W. Thompson was buried in the cemetery near the entrance. His gravestone is one of the first you see upon entering the cemetery. Mr. Thompson moved here in the early 1840's from Missippi State and acquired 300 acres of land just east of the church and cemetery grounds by building wagons for his neighbors and buying the land with the money he made from selling the wagons.

Mr. Thompson's second wife, Margaret McCollum is buried along-side him. His first wife, Jessie Nichol is also buried in the cemetery but the grave has been lost as so many others have been over the years.

E. W. Thompson was one of the descendants of one of the pilgrims who came over on the Mayflower.

The earliest identifiable grave is that of James Walker who was born September 9, 1817 and died May 18, 1874. He was one of the original trustees of the church, a landowner and a farmer. The Walker and Wilson families of today are descendants of James Walker.

James Walker originally settled at Staggers Point before moving to the Alexander community as a young man. His land was just west of the cemetery and is still owned by the W alker family. The church deed records make reference to James Walker's land and states that he had a 100 acre tract bordering the church property on the northeast boundary.

Many of the families and descendants of the Wesson community are buried here, as a result of the Wesson Methodist Church dissolving about 1900. Families such as the Hudspeths, Presnal's, Benbow's, and Moore's and others moved their membership to Alexander with the dissolution of the Wesson Church

William Lawrence, one of the original trustees, was buried in the cemetery in 1879. He lived just south of the church grounds. Several other graves that have been permanently marked date back to the 1870's.

The site of the cemetery is land that was deeded by Elizabeth Boatwright and John Singleton to the Alexander Methodist Episcopal Church South, predecessor church to the present Alexander United Methodist Church which has remained active since 1856.

The land on which the cemetery is located was deeded to five trustees of the church: James Walker, William Lawrence, William L. Glass, John Wallace, and Harvey Mitchell. Deed records indicate this donation of land was made "from an ardent desire to promote the interests of the Methodist Episcopal Church South" and for five dollars. The land was deeded to the Church on December 5, 1856 by Elizabeth Boatwright and John Singleton. Neither of the donors apparently lived in the Alexander community and neither are buried here to anyone's knowledge.

Early identifiable burials were during the 1870's, shortly after the Civil War, at a time when settlement in this area was accelerating. Persons buried here are the early settlers of the Alexander community and their descendants, settlers of the Wesson community who moved their church membership to Alexander about 1900, and others who lived in the area.

Burial in the cemetery has been generally confined to church members and residents of the area desiring burial there, regardless of denominations.

It is estimated that there are over 300 marked graves in the cemetery and many others that have been lost. Some wooden grave markers still remain, while most have been lost.

There are persons of all denominations buried here. One of the largest family plots is the Barnes family (11 graves) who were never members of Alexander Methodist Church.

There are several Catholics buried here. The first Catholic to be buried here was buried outside the cemetery grounds because the family did not wish to have her buried in a Protestant cemetery. This story was related to Miss Mae Walker by her grandmother. At one time many Italian Catholics lived south of Alexander, just a few miles away.

Many descendants of the early settlers of this area are still returned here for interment. For example, Dr. Arch Stallings, who had moved away from this community in the 1920's, was recently buried here in the cemetery alongside his ancestors. Dr. Stallings was a Veternarian and worked on the first hoof-and-mouth case in Texas.

The cemetery has been associated with both the Alexander Church and the now defunct Alexander School with all three having been located on the ten acres deeded to the church. The Alexander School building was moved several times until it was finally closed and the school children were transferred to the Tabor School.

The church building site has remained approximately the same since 1856. The present educational building was built in 1956 and the Parsonage was moved to its present location in 1960.

Until 1941, the cemetery was maintained by volunteer help and periodic cemetery work-days by the people of the community.

In 1941, the Alexander Cemetery Association was formed and fr --will

contributions have been accepted since then for the purpose of maintaining the cemetery. The first slate of officers to be elected in 1941 were: Mr. A. J. McCallum, President, and Mr. L. T. Wilson, Secretary-treasurer. Mr. Wilson served a short time and was replaced by the current secretary-treasurer, Joe B. Wlaker, who has served in that capacity for the past twenty-seven years.

The school was later housed in the first church building when the building was moved from the location of the present church to a location just west of the cemetery. The original church building was moved a second time to a location just off the church property approximately northwest of the church and continued to serve as a school building at its new location until it was eventually closed.

The property on which the cemetery is located is still owned by the church. The Cemetery Association provides a method of maintaining the cemetery. Since 1941, on each fourth Sunday in September, an annual homecomming is held at the church. The Cemetery Association conducts its, annual meeting and accepts donations from friends and descendants of those buried at Alexander. Thus far these free-will donations have provided sufficient funds to maintain the cemetery quite adequately.

People are still being buried in the cemetery at the rate of about 8 or 10 per year. It is routinely maintained by hired help, with capital expenditures, in the past by the association, for a chain link fence and a water supply system.

Research of the history of Alexander (primarily the church) was compiled by Rev. Fred Dibble, and Rev. Clifford Edge. Further research on the cemetery has come from interviews with senior citizens who are descendants of the families buried in the cemetery.

It is not known just when shoool was first held at Alexander, but in the book, The Life of Robert Alexander, in Carnagie Library are his writings. He states the Alexander Church was organized in 1854 in a one room log school house, wheather this was private or public it is not known.

As far back as we can trace from descendants of early settlers, they did have school in 1877-78.

Abbott

Abbott, Evelina, daughter of T. M. & M. B. Abbott, born in 1884 died 1900. She was related to Jim & Carl Sealy families.

The Ayres Family:

Thomas Ayres born 1859 died 1911. He and wife came to Texas from the State of Illinois. Nothing is known beyond that of where he lived. He married Gertrude Platsey from Germany. They came to Bryan to be near her brother who had come earlier.

They later moved to the James K. Presnal farm near Tabor and there lived for number of years.

Their children: Luis, born 1891, died 1966 married Rachel Finley.
Lena married Jim Sealy, now deceased and buried in Bryan Cemetery. Eva
married Jack Galeo. Minnie married Will Prince. Other children were Faye,
Jimmy, Tom and Benny.

Riley and Mary Alice Ball Family:

Their lineage has been traced back as far as 1480 in England. Mary Ball, born in 1707 in Virginia married Augustine Washington. One of their sons being George Washington, the first President of the United States. Family tradition is that the Balls migrated from Virginia to Kentucky, Tennessee, Missippi, Louisana and finally to Texas. It is not known just when they reached Texas, but Ferdinand James Ball and his mother built a two room log cabin on the east bank of the Navasota river in Madison County. At a place called Bundic Crossing. Ferdinand's father was a "slave trader" & once went away for a load of slaves and never returned.

Ferdinand's bible shows he married Sarah Curtis of St. Landry Parish, Louisana. They were members of the Sand Prairie Baptist Church in the community of George in Madison County. They are buried in Willow Hole Cemetery in Madison County. In 1876 Sarah and her children moved to Goliad. Ferdinand and Sarah had seven children. William Riley born 8-4-1856 is the only child buried in this area. William Riley married Mary Alice Crane of Shelby County Texas. She was born 3-4-1856, died 11-3-1928. Both of the above are interred at Alexander. William Riley and Mary Alice's children are:
Mary Bell, born 5-3-1886, Roy, born 11-27-1888, married Ollie Frances, born 1-13-1900 died 1945. Lula born 4-10-1892 died 7-30-1960. She married John H. White, born 1892, died 1950. Charile E. 7-15-1894 married Elizabeth Mathis. Madama, born 1898 married Paul Martin of Brookwood, Alabama. Vera born 1901, married Robert Earl Carlton of San Saba, Texas Rossew, born 2-4-1880, died 10-1-1945, married Mary Alice Mitchell.

The Barmore Family:

This family lived where David Butler now lives. They were regular in attendance of the first church. Getting the days of the week confused thinking it was Saturday. Mr. Barmore went to plow the fields, Mrs. Barmore was taking a cake for Sunday. Seeing her neighbors, the E. W. Thompsons passing on their way to church, she ran to the road and ask if someone had died. "No we are just going to church as usual on Sunday". After convincing her it was really Sunday, she said, "please go quickly and tell Mr. Barmore this is Sunday, to unhitch from the plow. I'll put the cake aside and dress quickly and we'll soon be on the way to church

William and Ann Barnes Family:

William was born in 1840_{\circ} died 1915. Ann born 1845 died 1931. William and his brother Lyon came from Ireland with Grandparents. It is believed that they landed near Galveston since they lived for many years where they farmed the land.

When he was in his teens he fell in love with a beautiful young girl who's family decided to move north. At the last moment William decided ne could not part with his sweetheart and so as the covered wagon started to more away he ran, caught the wagon and climbed inside. He traveled with the family until they reached what is now Normangee. It was then called Old San Antonio Crossing. Homesickness over took him. Not knowing just what the future would hold for him, he said "goodbye" to his beautiful lover and left the family to walk back to Anahuac, Chambers County. He walked as fast and as far as possible during the day. Slept some at night, listened to the wild animals call in the dark. The trees were very thick along the way, which made the journey most dangerous/ The only protection he had was a pocket knife. William often recalled in late life his spending the night alone at Bundic's Crossing on his way home. He walked to Milligan, there he caught a ride to near his home.

Soon thereafter he joined the army. Mrs. John Barnes has in her possession a letter William wrote to his grandmother in Anahuac from Camp Spright, date Dec 28th, no year given.

It is not known just where William met Ann Adkins. It is known that the Adkins family made a journey along the coastal area from Bell County. They mentioned the camp fires and deep wagon ruts. William and Ann were married and moved to Reliance, Brazos County. To this union was born thirteen child ren, however, only four lived to adulthood. Joseph, George (Dink), Mollie and John. Each married and reared their faimlies in the Tabor community and are interred in the Alexander Cemetery.

The Barnes family have the distinction of having the most family graves in Alexander Cemetery.

The Benbow camily:

Henry Benbow was born 1865 died 1946. Wife Martha was born 1865 died 1945. They came from Alabams and returned there several times. However, they purchased a track of land near the Harris School and Wesson Church.

To this union was born four children: Maggie & Sue, twins, born 1894, died 1963. Sue married Earl Presnal. Sue was very devoted to Alexander Church and assumed much of the responsibility of the church for a number of years. Sue was born 1894, died 1955. Tom, the son married Ella Edge. Tom & Ella are buried in Bryan City Cemetery. Sue and Earl are buried at Alexander. Mary Benbow, born 1891 died 1930 married Albert J. McCallum, born 1888, die 1959 also interned in Alexander Cemetery. Emily Roberta Johnson born 1874 died 1889. Margaret, wife of W. A. Johnson born 1850 died 1891 interred in Alexander Cemetery are relatives of the Benbows.

Mary Ann Johnson Benbow born 1843 died 1897 are parents of Mrs. Henry Benbow: Adam A. Benbow born 1833 died 1897

The Blum Family:

Darling Picney married Delanie Looney of Grimes County. Mr. Blum origionally came to Texas from Germany when a very young boy. It is said that he never saw his folks after leaving Germany. Their children: Frank, John, Lee, -married Julia Hensley, Mack married Maggie Hensley, Maranda and Fannie. The Blums lived near Alexander in the early 1800's. D. P. Blum was born 1839 died 1918, wife Delanie was born 1841, died 1925. Both are buried at Alexander.

W. H. & Sallie Boyett Family

W. H. Boyett was born in 1855 and died 1938. He came from Tennessee. Sallie Chilton Boyett was born 1871 and died 1956. They lived rich lives, worked hard tarming. Reared a fine family. The Boyetts contributed much to the community. They settle at Alexander in 1883. Miss Willie Boyett, a daughter, taught school at Alexander. Mrs. Boyett usually led the prayer meetings at the church. Sons Horace and Chilton and one infant are also interned in the Alexander Cemetery.

William And Abner Broach Family:

William & Abner Broach were twin boys and the only children in the family. I have no knowledge of who their parents were but they probably immigrated from Scotland in the early 1700's as William & Abner were born on April 10, 1819 in Georgia. The Broach's were immigrants from Scotland.

Little is known of the descendants of William's twin brother Abner, other than Norman Broach, M. D. who practiced medicine in and hear Pinelevel, Alabama in Montgomery County for over a half of a century. Norman Broach M.D. followed in his father's footsteps who practiced medicine in the Shady Grove community near Troy, Alabama. His father's name was Frank Broach and Dr. Frank Broach had a son, Frank that was a dentist in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Norman and Frank Broach had a sister named Caudia and she live with her widowed mother, Martha Broach until her death. Caudia never married. Dr. Norman Broach attended Atlanta College of Physicains and Surgeons which later absorbed by Emory University. Dr. Norman Broach married Myrtle Graves, a relative of a former Governor of Alabama, Bib Graves.

Dr. Norman and Myrtle Broach had a daughter, Martha, who married Sanderson Benbow of Pinelevel, Alabama, they in turn had a daughter Norma Sandra, she married and hod two children, a son and a daughter. They all live in Pinelevel, Alabama.

Having lived in Montgomery, Alabama for twenty years, my late husband, Davis H. Rawls Sr., was forn near Pinelevel, Alabama we come to know this family of the descendants of Abner Broach and we often visited with each other.

William Broach, as I have mentioned was born on April 10, 1819 married Nancy Eidison, both born in Georgin, moving to Alabama, them to Troup, Texas in Smith County in 1880. William and Nancy Broach stayed only a short while in Troup, Texas before moving to the Tabor community. Most of their children were reared in the Tabor community. William died on May 10, 1901 and Nancy E. Broach was born on Sept, 19, 1829, died on March 1,1909. Both are buried in the Alexander cemetery.

William Broach owned & operated the first cotton gin & first mill in this part of the County. It was located on a 28 acre tract of land located between Tabor, Texas and the Alexander cemetery known as the old Broach place. Cotton was carried to the loading ramp by the Broach boys in hand woven cotton baskets. The press was powered by horses and mules. Three bales of cotton ginned per day was a full days work for all the boys.

William & Nancy E. Broach were the parents of ten children, all being born in Alabama before moving to Texas. Several of the children did not come to Texas along with their parents as one daughter, Ella was married and two of the boys were away at college. The following children were born to them as follows:

- a. James L. (Jim) was the first child born to William & Nancy E. Broach, born in Alabama on Aug. 17, 1856. Died on March 22, 1934. He was married to Minnie Brodgon. James L. Operated a general store and post-office for several years at Tabor, Texas. They are both buried in the Alexander cemetery. Four children were born to the.
- 1. Gladys was the first child born to them, married Vernon Bailey of Bryan They have a son and daughter, Dorothy and Vernon. Gladys and Vernon live in Houston, Texas.
- 2. Laura was the second child born to Jim & Minner Broach, married Leroy Fouraker of Dallas, Texas, Leroy was a graduate of Texas A&M University and taught there until his death. He is buried in the Bryan City cemetery. They had two children, Lawrence & Linda. They both reside out of the state Laura lives in Bryan, Texas.
- 3. Douglas Brady was the only boy born to Jim & Minnie Broach. He left Texas about the year 1952 and resided in Santee, California until his death in 1972. He was married & had two sons, they both live in Houston, Texas and his wife Ruth, lives in Santee, California.
- 4. Dorothy was the fourth child born to Jim & Minnie Broach, she married Ray Fouraker a twin brother to Leroy Fouraker, he also was a graduate of Texas A&M University, taught there for several years, then moved to Rawleigh, North Caroline where he taught until his death. He is buried in Rawleigh. They had a son and a daughter. Dorothy resides in Rawleigh, North Carolina.
- b. Ella N. was the second child born to William & Nancy Broach on Aug 30, 1858, died Dec 22, 1940. Married to Jim Watson of Montgomery, Alabama, she was the daughter that never moved to Texas when her parents did in 1880. They had one son, Arthur Watson, married to Jonnie Lou Edge of the Mt. Carmet community in Alabama. Ella N. her husband Jim, and son Arthur are buried in the Mt. Carmel cemetery in Alabama. Jonnie Lou lives in Montgomery, Alabama.
- c. Robert A. (Bob) was the third child born to William & Nancy Broach, bo on Oct 1, 1859, near Rutledge, Alabama died Aug 6, 1938. I am not sure whether he came to Texas at the time his parents did in 1880 or not but he did live in Sommerville, Texas for several years, moving back to Greenville, Alabama and went into grocery business. He was married & his wife Lena died 8 months prior to his death. Lena was from Alabama and I just presume that he was married before moving to Texas. He died in Montgomery Alabama and they are both buried in a cemetery in Greenville, Alabama. They had three sons born to them.

- 1. Culver R. (Bob) the oldest, married Carrie Edna Smith of Montgomery, Alabama, Carrie Edna is deceased and buried in Montgomery, Alabama. They had one son, Bobby, he is married and has two children, a son and a daughter. They live in Montgomery, Alabama.
- 2. Raymond was the second son born to Robert A and Lena Broach and is married to the former Zuma Lee Misteldine of the Grady community near Ramer, Alabama. They live in Selma Alabama and they have one son.
- 3. Ferrel is the last son born to Robert A & Lena Broach. He is married and lives in Alexandria, La. His first wife is deceased and buried in Greenville, Alabama. He has a daughter by his first wife, Bettie, also a son.
- d. William was the fourth child born to William & Nancy Broach, born April 7, 1861, died Jan 28, 1902. He and his wife Mary, lived in or near Troup, Texas. He never moved to Tabor, Texas along with his parents when they moved from Troup. Little is known of his family.
- e. Richard was the fifth child born to William & Nancy Broach, born Dec 11, 1862, died in Lyons, Texas on March 30, 1930. Richard was born in Louisville, Alabama in Barbour County. He graduated in medicine from Nashville Collège, in Nashville, Tenn. in 1895. He came to Texas in 1895 after graduating from collège & married Rosalie Madora Bettis of Merle, Texas on Dec 15, 1899, whe was born on Jan 11, 1878, died May 16, 1948 in Bryan, Texas. Both are buried in Sommerville, Texas. They had five children.
- 1. Madeline Lucille, born Aug 25, 1900 in Merle, Texas in Burleson County married James Linton Robertson, born Sept 19, 1895 in Bryan, Texas, died July 2, 1959. Buried in the Bryan City cemetery. They had one son, James Linton, Jr. married Melba Steveson of Monroe, La. and had two children, William Linton & Dixie Lane. Madeline lives in Bryan, Texas.
- 2. Velma Madge was the second child born to Richard and Rosalie Broach, born Dec 22, 1903 in Lyons, Texas. She married James Davis, he is decease they had a son, James Alan and he is married to Joan Zappe and they have three children, a daughter Alann, James Arthur and John Alan Davis. They all live in Ft. Worth, Texas.
- 3. Lloyd was the third child born to Richard & Rosalie Broach, born July 6, 1906, died Nov 12, 1946. Buried in the Sommerville cemetery. He was never married.
- 4. Leon Ruston was the fourth child born to Richard & Rosalie Broach, born Dec 24, 1909 in Lyons, Texas, died in Bryan, Texas in 1950, married Annie Dee Nix and they had no children. Leon is buried in the Sommerville cemetery, Sommerville, Texas. Annie Dee remarried after Leon's death & lives in Bryan, Texas.
- 5. Lena Mae was the fifth child born to Richard & Rosalie Broach, born Jan 6, 1915 in Sommerville, Texas. She married Mart Higgins Wilson and they had three children, Dianne Carol & twins Rosalie & Roseana Wilson. They all live in Ft. Worth, Texas, Richard Broach M.D. practiced most of his life in the Lyons, Texas community.
- f. Duncan Broach was the sixth child born to William & Nancy Broach, born Feb 26, 1864, died June 26, 1911, married Mattie Eidson, born July 25, 1875 at Wellborn, Texas, died in Bryan, Texas and was buried in the Wellborn cemetery. Duncan is buried in the Alexander cemetery. Duncan

graduated in medicine from Nashville College, Nashville, Tennessee. He was living at Mumford, Texas at the time of his death. They had three daughters who were quite small when Duncan died and they were reared by a sister of Duncan's, Mattie Broach Fullerton of the Tabor community.

- 1. Cecil was the oldest of the daughters born to Duncan and Mattie E. Broach, born Nov 6, 1899 and married Ross Dean of the Tabor community. He was born Nov 3, 1897, died Dec 3, 1972, buried in the Alexander cemetery. They had no children. Cecil lives in Bryan, Texas.
- 2. Thelma was the second daughter born to Duncan & Mattie E. Broach, born June 19, 1904, married Fred Pearson of Houston, Texas. Fred is deceased & buried in Houston, Texas. They had no children. Thelma reside: in Houston.
- 3. Alma was the third child born to Duncan & Mattie E. Broach, born on Aug 18, 1906, married Walter Pate of the Harvey community near Bryan, Tex. They had two sons, Edwin and Donald Dean. Walter is deceased. Alma remarried after Walter's death and she lives in Dallas, Texas.
- g. Martha (Mattie) Broach was teh seventh child born to William & Nancy E. Broach, born in Alabama June 22, 1865, died Jan 31,1956. buried in Alexander cemetery. Mattie married John W. Fullerton of Tabor, Texas, born July 24, 1866, died 1957, buried in the Alexander cemetery. They had three children, all born in the Tabor community.
- 1. Jimmie was the first child born to John W. & Mattie Fullerton, born on March 9, 1889, died July 18, 1890. Buried in the Alexander cemetery.
- 2. Pearle was the only daughter born to John W. & Mattie Fullerton, born May 31, 1891, died Nov 30, 1956, buried in the Alexander cemetery. Pearle married Dr. A. L. Mondrick Sr., of Bryan. He is deceased and buried in Bryan City cemetery along with an infant son. The second son born to them was Albert L. Jr. born Nov 19, 1926, died Oct 2, 1965. Buried in Alexander cemetery.
- 3. Norman the third child born to John W & Mattie Fullerton was born Sept 9, 1897 died Dec 1, 1905. Buried in Alexander cemetery.
- h. Mosdon S. (Marr's) was the eight child born to William & Nancy Broach, born March 3, 1866, died Jan 8, 1953. Buried in the Alexander cemetery. He was married to Effic Little Fullerton on Nov 28, 1895. Effic was born in the Tabor community on Dec 3, 1874, died Oct 6, 1956. Buried in Alexander cemetery. Marr's was born in Crenshaw County, Alabama. Marr's & Effic L. Broach owned & operated a general store & post-office at Tabor when they first married. Marr's later sold out his business to his James L. and went into the farming business. All of their seven children were born in the Tabor community except one.
- 1. Johnnie Selvin was the first child born to Marr's & Effie L. Broach, born Nov 4, 1898, married to Jessie Kelly of the Narvey Community near Bryan. They have one son, SelvinKelly, born in Bryan, Texas, married to Nancy McDonald of Bryan and they have two sons, Kenneth & Donald both students at Texas A&M University. They all live in Bryan.
- 2. Henry Howard was the second child born to Marr's & Effie L. Broach, born April 2, 1900, married Grace Gilland of Franklin. Grace is deceased and buried in the Alexander cemetery. No children were born to them. Howalives in Bryan.

- 3. Richard Raymond (Dick) was the third child born to Marr's & Effie L. Broach, born Jan 22, 1902, married to Lois Gilstrap of Franklin, Texas. Lois was born in Madisonville, Texas. They have two sons, R. R. Jr. (Dickie) married to Jolene Fickey Scarmado of Bryan, Texas, they have five children. Rickey and Bill Broach, Michael, Melony and Janie Scarmado. The firls father was by a previous marriage and is deceased. Charles William was teh second son, married Glenda Brinkman of Caldwell, Texas and they have three children, Charles W. Jr. (Chuck) and Craig, and a daughter, Charla. They all live in Bryan, Texas.
- 4. Jewell was the fourth child born to Marr's and Effie L. Broach, born Oct 20, 1903, married to Adolph Syptak of Wheelock, Texas, they had one son, Harold George Syptak, married Virginia Matterson of Bryan, Texas they have four children, Suzanne, Deborah, and twin, boys, Richard and Randall Syptak. Jewell and Adolph live in Bryan, Texas.
- 5. Lola Mae (Tott) was the fifth child born to Marr's & Effie L. Broach, born March 3, 1905, married Davis W. Rawls Sr., of Montgomery, Alabams, born in Ramer, Alabama, Jan 31, 1901, died Dept 14, 1972. They had one son Davis H. Jr., born in Montgomery, Alabama, married to the former Rosemary Mancuso of Bryan., born in Houston, Texas, they have two children, Nathan Collier and Leah Denise Rawls. They live in Bryan, Texas. Davis H. Sr. is buried in the Alexander cemetery.
- 6. George William was the sixth child born to Marr's and Effie L. Broach, born Oct 13, 1907. He served in World War II. He received as Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with one Bronze Star, Good Conduct Medal one Service Stripe and Four Overseas Service Barrs. He received an honorable discharge on Oct 25, 1945. He never married and lives in Bryan, Tex.
- 7. Crystal Louise was the last child born to Marr's & Effie L. Broach, born in Bryan, Texas on Nov 24, 1912. She married George I. (Red) Hair, he is deceased and buried in the Alexander cemetery. They had ond daughter, Janette, married to Bill White of Vernon, Texas and they have two children, John E. (Jeb) Barr 111 and Cynthia Dawn Barr. The children were born in Georgia and Ft. Worth.
- i. Mary is the ninth child born to William & Nancy E. Broach, born June 22, 1868, died in 1951, married Edgar (Ed) Elliott and he was born in one of the Carolina's. Edgar (Ed) died in Dallas of pneumonia while visiting a daughter. Both are buried in the Alexander cemetery. They had six children.
- 1. Robert (Bob) was teh oldest child born to Ed & Mary B. Elliott, born in the Tabor community, married Mattie Dell Meads, she is deceased and buried in the Hearne cemetery. They had three children and an infant child. The infant is buried in the Alexander cemetery. The other three children are, Dovie, Marjorie and Joe. They are all married. After the death of Mattie Dell, B ob Married the second time. He & his wife owned & operated a gorcery store in Hearne until their retirement. They both live in Hearne.
- 2. Lillian was the next child born to Ed and Mary B. Elliott, born in the Tabor community, married Roland Crenshaw, he is deceased and buried in the Alexander cemetery, they had one son, Roland, Jr, born in Tabor. Married and has three daughters. Lillian lives in Richardson, Texas.
- 3. Abbie was the next child born to Ed and Mary B. Elliott, born at Tabor, married to John Waler of the Tabor community, John is deceased and buried in the Alexander cemetery along with an infant child. They have six other children, Morris, married and lives in Bryan. L nnie who is married and lives in Houston, they have one son.

Helen who is married and lives in Dallas, they have a child, Dorothy Jean married and lives in Houston, they have a daughter, and Fannie who is married and lives in Bryan, Texas. They have two children. Abbie resides with Fannie in Bryan.

- 4. Ray is the next child born to Ed & Mary Broach Elliott, born in the Tabor community, married and lives in Richardson, Texas. Ray has two daughters by a previous marriage, Edith and Lurline Smith. They are both married.
- 5. Curtis is the fifth child born to Ed & Mary B. Elliott, born in the Tabor community, deceased and buried in the Bickham cemetery near Tabor. He was married to Dell Rudasill, born at Tabor, they had two children, Barbara and Billie. - 2. William Brogdon was born 1845 died 1921. Wife, Laura Cook Brogdon born 1846, died 1946. Their children: Minnie Vernon, born 1878 died 195 Married James L. Broach, born 1856 died 1934. Their children: Gladys married Vernon Bailey. They live in Houston. Laura married Leroy Fouraker. Douglas married ... Dorothy married Ray Fouraker. The two Fourakers are deceased andburied elsewhere.
- 3. Lucy born 1879 died 1961 never married.
- 4. Stance T. born 1872 died 1962 never married.
- 5. Wm Jr, (Bose) born 1884 died 1969 married Udell Rudasell born 1885, died 1966 Bose and Udell have one son Maurice Brogdon born 190 died

died 1927, buried in Alexander cemetery. Willaim (Bill) Brogdon and daughter Minnie both taught school at different times at Alexander.

Buchanan Family:

J. D. Buchanan, born 1859 died 1882.

Burns Family:

Harriet Burns wife of A. B. Burns born 1859 died 1880 buried in Alexander cemetery.

Capps Family:

Athen Capps born 1893 died 1963. Lillie Capps born 1903 died 1973.

Chatham Family:

T. W. Chatham born 1851 died 1878. It is believed that he was related to the Deans and Hearnes.

The Conrad Family:

William Conrad was born 1888 died 1951. His wife Ruby Hudspeth born 1890 died 1964. Children: Charles Roy born 1919 died 1962. Ruben F. born 1924 died 1971, Frank born 1917 died 1922, Kenneth W born1928 died 1930. Charles Roy and Ruben were very devoted to Alexander church. In spite of handicaps they both rendered a valuable service to the church. Charle Roy drew the blueprint for the Education building and was recording Secretary and Ruben served as treasurer.

The Cooper Family:

Riley Cooper was born 1861 died 1937. His wife Minnie was born 1872 died 1963. Their children were Una who married Tom Smith , Luther, Charleston, married Ella Mae McCallum, born 1908 died 1961. Lanora (Rushie) born 1910 died 1969. Howard born 1910 died 1974. Mr. & Mrs. Cooper and two children buried at Alexander. The Coopers came to this area from Henry Prairie community.

The Coppock Family:

Chalmer Coppock born 1899 and died 1971 and wife Ethel lived in the community a few years and were faithful to the church. Mr. Cappock served as treasurer.

The Coyle Family:

Robert Coyle born 1904 died 1974. Mrs. Frankie Coyle born 1909 died 1974.

For the Dean Family, see story on J. H. & Sarah Fullerton.

The Edwards Family

Kirkland Edwards born 1907 died 1972. He was the brother of Mrs. Carro Mae McCallum (Tom). He was born at Milligan, Texas but often visited the Alexander church with his sister. He was educated in music and often played the piano when visiting Alexander church. At the time of his death he was teaching music in Texas City Public Schools. He is buried

The Ellis Family:

Tommy Ellis was born in 1905 died in 1970.

The Finley Family:

John Finley married Mollie Barnes born 1841 and died 1961. It is known that Mr. Finley came to Tabor from Alabama. The year is not known. John and Mollie Finley and two children, George & Mary are all buried in Alexander cemetery.

John Henry Fullerton Sr. & Sarah Caufiled Fullerton Family:

Henry & Mary Caufield Sr., were the parents of ten children, including Sarah who married John Henry Fullerton Sr & Sarah's father, Henry Caufield Sr. was born in Lisbon County, North Ireland in 1760. He married Mary Castle's, she was born in Ireland in 1775. They immigrated to Charleston, South Caroline in 1821 and then to Alabama in 1825. Henry Caufield Sr., died July 21, 1840 and Mary Caufield died on Dec 1, 1840. Both are buried in a cemetery at Boligee, Alabama.

John Henry Fullerton Sr., was born in Belfast, Ireland in 1775, his wife Sarah was born in Belfast, Ireland in 1790. They were of average means. They owned their own home and 27 acres of land that he farmed to raise food for his family and rented land from the British Government to raise cattle, hogs, sheep etc. on to earn money for the other necessities of life. He was twenty-five and Sarah was twenty years of age when they married in the year 1810 in Belfast, Ireland. John Henry Fullerton Sr., and wife Sarah Caufield Fullerton are buried in the Dunn cemetery near Wheelock, Texas.

William Fullerton, a younger brother of John Henry Sr., (we do not want to confuse this William Fullerton with the son of John Henry Sr.,) whom I shall mention later. This William Fullerton decided he would not wait for his inheritance and left Izeland in the year 1818. He came to South Carolina, thence to Tennessee where he acquired quite an amount of land and was considered a bachelor of great means. He decided to gain more land and wealth in Robertson Colony and came to Texas. He later joined the Texas Army and fought in the battle of San Jacinto in 1836. Along with others his name is listed on the San Jacinto Monument.

At first the Indians were not hostile to the new settlers in Texas, but later the officials of the Mexican Government became suspicious of the settlers and incited the Indians to hostility against the Colonists. William Fullerton (this is the brother of John Henry Sr.,) along with Hugh Henry, brother of Robert Henry were killed fighting back to back with guns and knives to subdue the attack. That was in Jan of 1839 & William Fullerton, Hugh Henry along with others were buried in a cemetery called Old Franklin. This battle happened near the city of Marlin, Texas.

It was through William's letters to his brother John Henry Sr., and other relatives that they too would come to America to seek a better way of life. They being of the Irish Protestant faith, they were always in conflict with the Irish Catholics which were in power at that time. They in turn decided to join their other relatives in America. In 1821 they all embarked on their long journey to the new world. With great hope and faith in their hearts, they arrived by sailboat six weeks later to Charleston, South Carolina.

All the families were Presbyterians, after coming to Boligee, /labama

they erected their first Presbyterian church. It was in the year 1831. Thomas Caufield, uncle of Sarah Caufield Fullerton was the first of these early settlers to die and was buried in the churchyard. Today this old church is still standing and in this churchyard you will see many graves of the early settlers that came to America.

William Fullerton, brother of John Henry Fullerton Sr., was still interested in his family and other relatives in Alabama so in the spring of 1833, he made a visit to see them. While he was there he met and married a widow with three children and her name was Margaret Henry Wilson. Her husband was deceased. William had already acquired land under Sterling C. Robertson and his story was so interesting and convincing that the others decided to move to Texas. They sold all their land, brought only what they could bring with them, some brought their slaves. I understand that the Fullerton's did not believe in slavery so they were of the ones that did not own slaves. They left Boligee, Alabama in Dec of 1833 for the long journey to Texas. John Henry Fullerton Sr., and his family, the Henry Caufield Sr., and his family and others were among the early settlers to leave Alabama for Texas. Hugh Henry and family were among them also. They left with the lope and faith that sustained them when they left Ireland for America.

These families came by carryalls and ox drawn covered wagons enduring the hardships that they encountered each day. They being christians, they rested on the Sabbath day and traveled only on the remaining days of the week. They encountered lots of difficulty in crossing the Mississippi River as they had to make their own makeshift barges of logs and it must have been days of waiting before they could journey on. traveled the Old San Antonio road, often corssing the Navasota river. Often the wagons would bog down or need repair, it would take days before they could continue their journey. At the last stop, they investigated the surroundings and decided that would be where they would settle. The Mexican Government at that time gave each family of the Colonists under Stephen F. Austin and Sterling C. Robertson contracts, a headright league containing 4428 acres of land and also a labor of land of 177 acres each. John Henry Fullerton Sr., and his son, John Henry, Jr., took their leagues of land of 177 acres each at Benchley, Texas, (then called Stagger's Point) William & Mary Fullerton adjoined the others but their land lay in Brazos County. Henry Sr., and wife Sarah Caufield Fullerton lived on their land of 177 acres in Robertson County. Isabella Caufield Dunn, sister of Sarah Fullerton and some of the Caufield's lived on Wheelock Praire in Robertson County.

These families formed an Irish Protestant church known as "Concord" on Red Top Prairie.

John Henry Sr., and Sarah Caufield Fullerton had three children born in Belfast, Ireland, three in Boligee, Alabama and one in South Carolina.

- 1. Mary, the oldest child was born in Belfast, Ireland in 1815 and she was married to William Henry, Nov 1, 1831. William was also born in Ireland and they had three children.
- 2. John Henry Jr., was their second child born in Belfast, Ireland in 1817, married Nancy Walker, took his land as a colonists under Sterling C. Robertson, in Robertson County, Texas. Henry Jr's., name appears on the Roster of Rangers who went to Ft. Milan, Jan 17, 1836. He & Nancy later moved to Navarro County, Texas.

- 3. John was the third child born to John Henry Sr., and Sarah Caufield Fullerton, born in Belfast, Ireland in 1820. He married his step cousin, Isabella Wilson, daughter of Margaret Henry Wilson Fullerton, and step-daughter of William Fullerton (this William Fullerton was the younger brother of JohnHenry Sr.,) Isabella died when her daughter Susan was born. The 1850 census shows that John & Susan lived with Margaret Fullerton's mother, Isabella.
- 4. Isabella was the fourth child born to John Henry Sr., & Sarah Caufield Fullerton, born in South Carolina in 1823. She married John Walker of Robertson County & buried in the Walker cemetery in Robertson County. Isabella died before 1850 leaving her husband and two children, Sarah Elizabeth (Bettie) married Joe Berry, William Henry married Alice McMillan and they had one son, Claude Walker, he died in 1965.
- 5. William was the fifth child born to John Henry Sr., & Sarah Caufield Fullerton, born in Alabama in 1825. He never married and lived at Benchley, Texas with his mother Sarah Caufield Fullerton until her death in 1856. She was buried in the Dunn cemetery along with her husband, John Henry Sr., The Dunn cemetery is located in Robertson County near Wheelock, Texas. After William's mother died, he joined the Confederate Army and was killed at the Battle of Gettesburg.
- 6. Thomas J. the sixth child born to John Henry Sr., & Sarah Caufield Fullerton, born in the year 1830, married Ann Jane Henry, she was born April 9, 1835 and died March 18, 1880. Thomas J. was scalped by the Indians and was buried in the Walker cemetery in Robertson County, Ann Jane is buried in the Alexander cemetery. They had three children, Molli Bettie and William.
- a. Mollie Fullerton, born Nov 16, married A. A. Dean of the Tabor community. A. A. Dean is buried in the Alexander cemetery, also his wife, Mollie. They had one daughter, Ollie Dean, married Paul Martin, Ollie is deceased and buried in Dallas, Texas.
- b. Bettie Fullerton, born Dec 13, 1859, died Nov 25, 1906 and buried in Alexander cemetery. Bettie married John Rainey and had one daughter, Daisey Rainey, Born Jan 29, 1880, died Jan 1895. After the death of her husband John Rainey, and her sister Mollie Fullerton Dean, A. A. Dean married the second time to Bettie Fulelrton Rainey and they had one son, Ross Dean, married to Cecil Broach, oldest daughter of Dr. Duncan Broach. Ross died Dec 3, 1972 and buried in the Alexander cemetery. Dr. Duncan Broach is also buried in the Alexander cemetery. Ross & Cecil were both reared in the Tabor community.
- c. William Fullerton born Nov 25, 1856 died Aug 23, 1878. He never married and is buried in the Alexander cemetery.
- 7. George Hays is the seventh child born to John Henry Sr., & Sarah Caufield Fullerton, born in Alabama on Aug 20, 1833, died in Bryan, Texas on May 29, 1922. He was married to Lucy Catherine McNair in 1857, she was born in Mississippi in 1834 died in 1899. Both are buried in the Alexander cemetery. Six children were born to them, John W., Catherine Ann (Kate), Henry, Mary Isabella, Effic and Barbara.

George Hays and Lucy Catherine Fullerton lived most of their lives in the Tabor community, reared his entire family there and most of his immediate children's children live in or near Tabor, Texas. Various children of John Henry Sr., and Sarah Caufield Fullerton were instrumental in building the first Methodist church ever erected in the Tabor community. It was accommod to 1856 to an old log schoolbours by the Per

Robert Alexander, a circuit rider. The first church was constructed of hand hewn logs. George Hays Fullerton (even though he was a Presbyterian) was one that gave of his time and energy to help build this church. The hammer that he used in helping to build this church is still in the Fullerton family and has been handed down to one of his great-great grandsons, Kenneth Broach, great-grandson of one of his daughters, Effie Fullerton Broach.

George Hays Fullerton was a Confederate Veteran of Company 1, Twenty First Calvary. In Dec, k861 this Company was organized at Booneville, Texas. From there they went to Millican, Texas then the termius of the H & T C R R from Millican, Texas to Navasota, Texas, hence to Shreveport, La. and joined what was known as Carter's Brigade composed of three regiments under the Generalship of Magruder, they were transferred to the front line of Missouri and Arkansas in the spring of 1862. At the end of the war in 1865, George Hays was given an honorable discharge. It is known that George Hays had a horse shot from under him and a bullet grazed his scalp leaving a bullet hole through his hat.

TO RECAP: The obiturary that appeared in the Bryan Eagle in 1922 describes the kind of a man George Hays was and the kind of a life that ' he lived. Mr. Fullerton became a member of the Presbyterian church at an early age and remained a constant member up to the time of his death. He was an honorable, industrious intelligent farmer, interferring at no time with other peoples affairs. He had no enemies and was loved by all who knew him. He was never known to utter an oath, nor in anyway take the Lord's name in vain. He was the last of the early settlers in this part of the county. He remained on the farm as long as his health permitted. A home was purchased on the road to Bryan and College Station (known as Hillcrest) there he lived with his daughter Barbara Fullerton until his spirit was called hence, just at the close of the day on May 29, 1922, a befitting time for the departure of such a gentle spirit from time to eternity. Peace to his ashes, may his quiet life as a christian and death be a means of inducing many other's to so live that their final reward will be eternal happiness.

Pearle was born May 11, 1891, died Nov 30, 1956. Buried in the Alexander cemetery. Pearle was married to Dr. A. L. Mondrick of Bryan, Tex as. He is deceased and buried in the Bryan City cemetery along with an infant son. They had another son, Albert L, Jr., born Nov 19, 1926, died Oct 2, 1965. Buried in the Alexander cemetery.

b. Catherine Ann (Kate) was the second child born to George Hays and

Lucy Catherine Fullerton, born Aug 6, 1868, died in Franklin, Texas on June 14, 1943. Buried in the Alexander cemetery. Kate was married to Will Thompson, born near Tabor on Feb 4, 1872, died in Franklin, Texas on April 4, 1927. They had six daughters, Bessie Lee, Lucy Myrtle, Ruth, Lucille, Catherine Ann and Mattie. Will Thompson was buried in the Alexander cemetery.

Bessie Lee died when a small child, born on March 30, 1896, died Nov, 1900. Buried in the Alexander cemetery.

Lucy Myrtle died when a small child, born Nov 6, 1898, died Nov 20, 1900, buried in the Alexander cemetery:

Ruth died at the age of eighteen, born in Wheelock Texas, Oct 2, 1900 died March 18, 1918. Buried in the Alexander cemetery. Bessie Lee & Lucy Myrtle were born in Brazos County near Tabor, Texas.

Lucille born in Wheelock Texas on Dec 24, 1902 married Ellis Martin of Easterly, Texas, Ellis is deceased and buried in the Easterly cemetery. Lucille lives in Franklin, Texas.

Catherine Ann was born in Wheelock, Texas on Dec 12, 1904, married James (Jim) Galloway of Franklin, Texas, Catherine Ann is County Clerk for Robertson County. They had two daughters, Catherine Ann born in Franklin, Texas, married to Billie Joe Drehr of Milano, Texas. They have four children. Darla Ann, Donna Adel, David Alan and Billie J. Drehr. They live in Cuero, Texas. Mary Elizabeth (Tenny) born in Franklin, Texas, married Joel Petteway, Joel is deceased and they have two sons, Joel Lynn and James Keith Petteway. They all live in Franklin with Catherine & Jim.

Mattie Adel, the sixth child born to Will & Catherine (Kate) Thompson was born in Wheelock, Texas on may 16, 1907 married Hans Paul Schultz of New Baden, Texas. They own and operate a store along with their son, Paul, Jr., is married to Ruth Wasserman of Rosebud, Texas. They have five children, Charles Alan, Stephen Wayne, Sara Ruth, Joseph and Susan. Dorothy Virginia the oldest child of Paul & Mattie Schultz is married to Ray Akins of Brady, Texas. They have three children, Mina Ruth who has finished college and is married, Laura Sue and Martie Akins both are students at Texas University.

- c. Mary Isabella was the third child born to George Hays and Lucy Catherine Fullerton, born in the Tabor community of Dec 20, 1871, died Oct 18, 1906. Mary never married and is buried in the Alexander cemetery.
- d. Henry R. was the fourth child born to George Hays & Lucy Catherine Fullerton on Jan 7, 1873 died Aug 7, 1898. Henry R. was never married and is buried in the Alexander cemetery.
- e. Effie Little was the fifth child born to George Hays & Lucy Catherine Fullerton, born on Dec 3, 1874, died Oct 6, 1956 buried in the Alexander cemetery. She married Mosdon S. (Marr's) Broach on Nov 28, 1895. Marr's was born in Crenshaw County Alabama on March 3, 1966, died Jan 8, 1953 buried in the Alexander cemetery. They owned and operated a general store and post-office when they were first married. Seven children were born to them.

Johnnie Selven was the oldest of the children born on Nov 4, 1898,

married Jessie Mae Kelley of the Harvey community near Bryan, Texas and they had one son, Selvin Kelley and he is married to the former Nancy McDonald of Bryan, Texas and they have two sons, Kenneth and Donald, both students at Texas A&M University.

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f. Barbara L. was teh last child born to George Hays and Lucy Fullerton, Born Jan 7, 1878. Barbara never married and lived with her father until his death in 1922. Barbara lives in Bryan, Texas and is blind, her Bealth is good considering her age of 96 years. She will be buried in the Alexander cemetery at her death.

This concludes the lives of these early settlers and their families that live and have lived, born and reared in the Tabor community and adjoining County, Robertson. All of Geroge Hays children were born and reared in the Tabor, Texas community. All of Effic Fullerton Broach's children are living and reside in Bryan, Texas.

Lucy Catherine Fullerton, born Aug 6, 1868, died in Franklin, Texas on June 14, 1943. Buried in the Alexander cemetery. Kate was married to Will Thompson, born near Tabor on Feb 4, 1872, died in Franklin, Texas on April 4, 1927. They had six daughters, Bessie Lee, Lucy Myrtle, Ruth, Lucille, Catherine Ann and Mattie. Will Thompson was buried in the Alexander cemetery.

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Lola Mae (Tott) Broach Rawls, greatgreat grand-daughter of John Henry Sr., and Sarah Caufield Fullerton, granddaughter of George Hays and Lucy Fullerton and daughter of Marr's & Effic Fullerton Broach. (8-15-74)

Glaze Family:

Louis Glaze born 1873 died 1959 married Hattie Josey born 1882 died 1941. They had no children but reared four of Mills and Leah Josey's children after Leah died.

The Glaze family lived near Benchley. Louis sisters were Mrs. Will Hill (Cora) of Edge, Mrg. Ed Payne also of Edge married Maggie Glaze, she died, he later married Etta Glaze. The brother Frank Glaze married Emily Skains.

Gregory Family:

Lee Otha Gregory born 1863, died 1941.

The Harrison Family:

Isaac R. Harrison born in 1861 died 1946. Mr. Harrison came from Putnam County, Georgia. He settled first at Livingston, Texas. After several years he moved to near Wheelock where he met and married Miss Nora Maniord who was born in 1873 died 1951.

To this union was born eight children: James Nathaniel born 1889 died 1959 married Verna Wilson. E. C. (Bud) born 1891 died 1971 never married. I. B. Harrison married Nora Holiday. George married Mary Frances Dunn and is buried in Wheelock cemetery. Edna born 1893 died 1918 married Matt Glover. Priness married Herman Blanton. Edgar born 1908 died 1910.

Mrs. Mary E. Maniord, mother of Mrs. Harrison is also buried on the Harrison plot. She was born 1847 died 1934.

The Haltom Family:

Jessie Haltom born 1882, died 1904.

The Hampton Family:

Aaron H. Hampton born 1900 died 1971.

The Hearne Family:

William Thomas Hearne was born 1855 died 1895 married Louella Dean who was born 1855 and died 1947.

Children: Edward Hearne born 1878 and died 1918, Stephen Dean, born 1880, died 1952, Lillie Dale born 1887 died 1942. Lula Hearne born 1889 died 1890, Bessie Hearne born 1891 died 1892. Mollie Shelton, wife on George Shelton was also related to the Hearnes and Deans, so was the mother of Mr. Pat Newton.

The Boggs Family:

W. M. Boggs known as Billy was born 1849 and died 1918. He was a brother of Mrs. Lou Boggs Wilcox (Mark, Sr.,) Billy lived with Mrs. Wilcox. Milton and Hugh Boggs nephews of Billy are also buried at Alexander cemetery.

The Henry Family:

The Henry's of Alexander community originated with Robert Henry of Ireland who married Elazabeth Downing of London in 1820. Shortly after their wedding, set sail to America. With him came his three brothers an seven other families. After three months on ship they finally reached South Carolina. They all stayed in South Carolina for a year then headed for Texas. They reached Alabama where they spent several years. Robert Henry was the first to reach the prairie near the Brazos in what is now Brazos County in 1829. He built the first cotton gin, and planted the first patch of rye, which in later years, became the name of a community near Benchley. Rye Community.

In a few years the Mexican government realized that the Scotch-Irish immigrants had taken definite control of their norther province. The Henry's and Houston families were friends in Ireland. Robert Henry was a soldier in the Texas Army before Sam Houston became its Commander in chief. Robert Henry was granted much land from the Mexican Grovernment for his participation in the battle of San Jacinto. The land office in Austin reveals that he received so much acreage that he returned field notes for 600 acres.

His wife Elazabeth was a courageous woman. She held her ground with the Indians and was very helpful with the sick.

They had several children that lived to adulthood. Mary Henry married Bradford Seale. Elizabeth married Columbus Seale. Hugh, the eldest took his portion of land in the area of Alexander community in 1842. He married Mary Foley. To this union was born, James Sidney Henry, who in later years settled in Hearne, Texas. Harvey Henry married Bettie Brogdon. Sam married Sallie McDonald. Margaret married Thomas Johnson, a school teacher. Susan married Henry Mc Donald.

After Hugh Henry's first wife preceded him in death he later married Barbara McNair McDowell of Madison County. To them were born three children. Two of them died in infancy. George Henry grew to manhood and married Mae Thompson. He claimed his inheirtance, the homestead of his father Hugh, and reared his family. George was born 1882 died 1920. To this union seven children were born. Ola Maye, Bessie Marie, Willis Herbert, Loyce Selma, Eula Lee, Elzie Emmett & Leslie Bryan.

Hugh Henry like all early settlers chose to have a family cemetery on his own soil. He and his two wives, daughter Margaret and her husband and several infants of his sons are buried in this cemetery.

The cemetery is on the property now owned by Alex McCallum Jr. across the road from the old Hugh Henry place.

George F. Henry chose not to be buried in the Henry cemetery. He and two children, Leslie and Marie are buried at Alexander.

The descendants are still in possession of a part of the Hugh Henry property. Hugh Henry settled this land in 1842. The dug wel used

a crepe myrtle tree still blooms that stood in the origional yard. Homes were miles apart in those days and weary travelers were always welcomed at the Henry home. But one autumn night not so welcomed a guest appeared. Hugh Henry was awakened by a noise in the kitchen, no screens and all windows opened. It was his custom to sleep with his pistol under his pillow. He clutched his pistol and called "Who is there"? No answer, he called again and said if you don't talk I'm going to shoot, no answer came, and he shot. As she fell she said "Woman". She was a gypsey woman dressed in men's clothing. Seeing she was greatly in need of medical attention Hugh sent his oldest son to get Dr. Cameron who lived at Wheelook. In the meantime Hugh and family had placed the woman on a palate on the long front porch. Dr. Cameron arrived at day break, examined her and said that she would soon die due to loss of blood.

She had in a sack on her body many jewels and articles thought to belong to citizens in Wheelock. Hugh asked Dr. Cameron to notify the persons missing articles co come and claim them. It was learned later that she or some of her party had climbed in a second story window of the Cavitt home with vicious dogs in the yard.

The gypsey woman died and was buried in the shade of an oak tree between the Henry home and the Henry cemetery.

The Holden Family:

Jeff Holden and wife Hannah had three sons, Charlie, born 1854, died 1941, married Lillie, Martin, born 1885 died 1892 was Superintendent of Sunday in the first church for several years. They had no children, but reared Carrie Chilton Seale. Heorge Holden married Florence Lemmons. Pee Holden married Maggie Martin. Thomas Holden born 1846 died 1925. A brother of Jeff Holden married Julia Leathers. Their children were Ella who married Billy Blanton, Walter married Laura Presnal, Horace born 1873 died 1947, married Margaret McMillian, born 1875 died 1892.

John Holden and wife Lennie cousins to the above Holdens also lived in the Alexander community for years. Their children: Nanie, born 1875 died 1891, Maggie married E. W. Thompson, Jr. Alma married Robert Bosque, Eddie and Ruby deceased early & Myrtle.

The Hensley Family:

John Hensley born Dec 31, 1868, died Jan 11, 1958, wife Mary born Oct 14, 1877, died June 1, 1951. Children were Julia married Lee Bloom, Gussie, married Robert Holiday, Maggie married Mack Blum.

The Holiday Family:

Grady Holiday son of Gussie and Robert Holiday was born 1920 and died 1960.

The Holmes Family:

J. C. Holmes born 1837 died Olivia Holmes forn 1846. It is thought that these two persons are the mother and father of Will & Charlie Holmes who farmed around Alexander in their early days and decided farming was not for them. Charlie kept the post office at Tabor until he & Will came to Bryan. The following are probably children of J. C. & Olivia Holmes, Neppie born, 1874, Mattie born 1888, Thomas, Forn 1879,

Mrs. Lillie Flanigan Edge (J. L.) who is now one hundred and one years of age was orphaned at a very young age and lived with the above family of Holmes. Mrs Edge's mother
and father are buried beside the Holmes family. A marker stands with only Mother and
Father Flanigan inscribed on it.

The Hudspeth Family:

Robert Hudspeth was born Dec. 18, 1828 at Sommerville, Tenn. He came to Texas in 1848 and settled first at Marshall, Texas, where he lived until 1852, then moved on to Richmond, Texas. He stayed only a short time in this area. In 1853, he settled in Wheelock and lived there until 1861. It was at Wheelock that he met and married Miss Minurva Collins on Sept 6, 1854. To this union five children were born; Mary Frances, Wm. Moore (born 1856, died 1936), Laura Ann, Thomas Benton, and Robert Henry. Minurva died Feb. 1, 1964. He later married Mary Kellough born 1838 and died Jan. 27, 1894. They had no children. Robert Hudsperh owned a store at Wheelock. He enlisted in the army of the Civil War in 1861. He was in Company One, 21st Texas Regiment. Robert was made captain of his company. He served four years. He came back to Wheelock and lived one year.

In 1866 he moved to the Tabor Community of which Alexander was a part, after the schools were consolidated. In 1903, he married Myrtle Nichols, a step sister of Frank Nichol, Sr. of the Tabor Community. She lived only three years and is buried at Bickhan Cemetery.

In 1855, he was made a Royal Arch Mason and at the time of his death was one of the two oldest masons in the state of Texas.

Robert Hudspeth built a nice home on his 850 ecres of land. He rode horseback to Houston to get the paper work done for his land and to buy the lumber for his home. The lumber was transported from Houston with exen-drawn wagons.

He died Jan. 12; 1912. Each of his children inherited their fair share of land. William received the home place. There he and his wife Frances Roy born 1864 died 1945 reared their family. The children: Nell maried Lute Woodali; Ruby married William Conrad; Martha maried Claude Shannon; Maudell married Frank Worsham; Roland married Lavonia Turner, she died and he later married Lucile Gallaton Worsham; Hewell married Arnold Stevener. William Hudspeth's estate passed down to his children at his death. Jewell and Arnold Stevener received the home place of Robert, then William Hudspeth; therefore, the property meets the Land Heritage requirements of being in the same family of a hundred years or more.

Jewell and Arnold had one child Ralph Arnold who has contributed much since early childhood to the Alexander church by playing the pians for church services and funerals.

Robert Hudspeth and his second wife Mary Kellough, his son William and wife Frances are all buried in Alexander Cemetery.

The Jernigan Family:

Laura Jernigan was the daughter of J. T. Josey. She was born 1872 and died 1970. The following are her children: Beulah, born 1895, died 1921; Homer, born 1893, died 1959; Willie, born 1892, died 1892.

The Josey Family:

Census report of North Hampton Co., North Caroline list John Josey born 1730, children listed, 3 males, 2 females and 4 male slaves

Thomas Jefferson Josey was born in 1845, Butler Co., Alabama. He died in 1904 an' was

1848, Butler Co., Ala. and died in 1901, buried in Alexander Cemetary. Thomas and Emlie Josey came to Texas sometime in the year of 1871 to Wheeler Co., Texas, and later moved and settled at Benchley, Texas. They had 12 children, 3 with them when they came to Texas.

The children of Thomas Jefferson Josey and Emile Josey and the following: Walter, born 1873, died 1896; Laura, born 1872, died 1967, married Chas. Jernigan; Della, born 1873, died 1929; Maggie, born 1884, died 1965, married Alex McCallum; Hattie, born 1882, died 1965, married Louis Glaze; Mills, born 1888, died 1966, married Leah Worsham; Will, born 1886, died 1966, married Lee Guthrie; Tomas Richard, 1870-1921, married Anna Jernigan, Hempstead, Texas; Lee, 1880-1954, married Minnie Allen and lived in Hearne, Texas; Edgar, born 1890, died 1900; Alice, born 1876, died 1877; Enma Elizabeth, born 1868, died 1956, married Billy Stallings. Nine of the twelve children above are buried at Alexander.

The Kennedy Family:

Oliver H. Kennedy, born 1885, died 1889.

The Lawrence Family:

William Lawrence was born in 1815 and died 1878. He was one of the trustees that the land for the church was deeded to; however, very little is known about him. He did have a brother, Jim Lawrence who was a large land owner and settled several miles northeast of the church very near the Hudspeth and Presnal homes.

There are several infants buried in the row with William Lawrence. It is not known whether they are his children. Each one has a marker, Helen Irene Lawrence, born 1877, died 1878, Mary Verzilla, daughter of J. C. and A. Lawrence, born May 1879, died Sept. 1879, Bobby Lawrence died Feb. 10, 1872.

The C. A. and Martha Lefevre Family:

Cornellious Lefevre was born Sept. 16, 1834, died May 5, 1915. Martha was born May 2, 1843 and died May 19, 1917.

Mr. Lefevre was a Frenchman. It is not known what year he came to the Alexander Community. But it is known that he lived near the church grounds and attended all services possible in the first church.

C. A. Lefevre married Martha Warren of the Wheelock Community. Their children were: Clara who married Jim Henry, Armanda who married Jim Parker, Bell who married Will Wallace, Eva, born 1879, died 1915 who married Mark Rudisel. Gus, Volney, and Albert the sons moved away before marriage.

The only living descendants of this family are Mrs. Mae Cloud, Mrs. Della Graham, Mrs. Katie Henry Dorrell, Claude Henry, and Lillie May Wallace.

The Effie and John Lindsey Family:

John Buchanan Lindsey's father and brothers came to America from Wales. They settled in Alabama for sometime. It is not known whether they all came to Texas or not. Mr. Lindsey was born 1857 and died 1947 not much is known of his early family. It is however known that he had one sister Fannie who married a Mr. Shehorn of Bell County. A niece, the daughter of this sister often visited them when she was young. Mr. Lindsey met and married Effie McWhorter in Grimes County. Her parents were William McWhorter Sr. and Ann McNair. The other McWhorter children were Ann who married a Mr. Harrison of Grimes County (a brother of the old Dr. Harrison of Bryan.) Bynum a son married Ann Duncan. This couple lived in the Alexander area for several years.

Effie and John Lindsey had the following children; Minnie, died in infancy, Walter married Hattie Alphin, Ola married George Wilson, Annie never married. Walter's daughter--Mrs. Ruth McCall has her grandfather McWhorter's discharge papers from the army of the Civil War, dated July 11, 1865 at Millican Texas, signed Joseph Berry. Mr. & Mrs. Lindsay and two daughters are buried at Alexander.

The Lyons, English and Beard Family:

There are three wooden markers in a row, still in tact except for the lettering, in Alexander Cemetery. They are probably among the oldest of graves. Some of the settlers remember the names on the markers to be Lyons, English and Beard. It was Known that Grandma Lyons lived west of the cemetery. In the early 1800°s it is thought that English and Beard may have been here married daughters or their husbands. They are buried near the Lawrences. It is also known that Dr. Lawrence, a dentist, who practiced in Bryan for many years (now deceased), nother was a Lyons. It is thought that one of these graves is Grandma Lyons as she was known.

The Ed Mathis Family:

Ed Mathis born 1875 died 1930 wife Lestina Mathis born 1885 died 1948 and several infants are buried at Alexander. This family also lived near Alexander for a while.

The McCallum Family:

John Hugh McCallum born 1841 in Glasco, Scotland, died 1927, married Mae Kennedy, born 1846 in Glasco, Scotland, died 1932. Both buried at Alexander. John, Sr. and Mae McCallum landed in Galveston, Texas near the end of 1866, with one son. From Galveston they traveled by crain to Millican, Texas, which was the end of the line for the train. After a short stay in Millican they settled near Bryan, in the Cameron Ranch community. John owned and operated a cotton gin which was located on land between the Johnny Wilcox place and what is now the Carrol Cooper place, across the road from Alexander Church. They later moved to the Tabor community, where they continued to operate a cotton gin, the gin being then in the Tabor community. Upon retirement of John, Sr., John Hugh, Jr. took over the ownership and operation of the gin. They also farmed in the community.

During time of Service with the U.S. Navy, Albert (Buck) McCallum, the 8th child of nime children borned to John, Sr. and Mae M cCallum, made several visits to Scotland. And during World War II Alex McCallum Jr., son of Alex McCallum, who wasJohn and Mae's 3rd child, also visited in Scotland.

Children of John & Mae McCallum are: Arch born 1863 died 1900. He married Mattie Thompson. John H. born 1870 died 1961 and he never married. Alex born 1874 died 1931 married Maggie Josey. Ada Buried at Red Top (Seale) cemetery. Elizabeth married Ned McWhorter born 1882 died 1960. Annie born 1885 died 1956, married Marvin Thompson. Thomas J. born 1898 died 1960 married Carro Mae Edwards. Albert born 1888 died 1959 married Mary Benbow, died, he later married Susie Mitchell of Normangee.

The McDowell Family:

R. D. McDowell born 1863 died 1969.

The McMillan Family:

Buried in the Alexander Cemetery was born June 25, 1821 in Charleston South Carolina six weeks after the death of his father. His mother Ann McMillan and her four children came along to Staggers Point with the other Irish settlers. Ann McMillan received a league of land from the Mexican Government. She divided this land among her four children George's part was between Calvert and Bremond. George never

John Attended school near Tabor and with Tillie Chatham who he later married. He also attended College to prepare himself to be a teacher.

Tillie Chatham was the daughter of Tillman and Molly Hudspeth Chatham. Tillman chatham was a native of the Shenandors Valley in Tennessee. Molly was the daughter of Robert Hudspeth of Tabor. Molly married Tillman Chatham in the early part of 1877, he died in August of 1878. Tillie was born March 11, 1879 in the home of her grandfather Robert Hudspeth.

When Tillie was two years old Molly Chatham married James K. Presnal and settled on the ninty-eight acres tract left to Molly at the death of her first husband. James K. and Molly Presnal had five other children and Tillie to make it half a dozen. The Presnals attended Wesson Methodist Church until it closed its doors in 1900. Tillie joined the Church at an early age. When Wesson closed they moved their membership to Alexander Methodist Church. When Tillie was fourteen she went to live with her Grandfather, "Ole Pa" as she so fondly called him. She cooked and took care of the house for him until she married John M. Moore on December 2, 1896. They married in the home of her parents which left wonderful memories for both the bride and groom.

After John and Tillie were married they moved to Kurten and stayed about three years and moved to a place they bought near Mathis Creek where they expanded to a farm with nine hundred acres. John not only farmed but taught school at different places. There was Fickey School, a school in Robertson County near Hearne and finally Harris School, twenty-three years elementary education. After thisthere was 12 years of being a County Commissioner, afterword a farmer and rancher. John and Tillie were the proud parents of six children - Tillman, Aubrey, Inez, Irenz, Henry, and Morris. Tillman and Inez were teachers following dad's footsteps.

Aubrey was an electrician. Trene one of the finest cooks anywhere, following Mom's footsteps. Henry and Morris were plumbers now turn ranchers.

This family attended Alexander until they parried and moved away. Tillman married Velma Tauett of Beaumont and moved to Canyon, Texas to teach. Aubrey married Jewell Mathis of Steep Hollow, moved to Collega Station and later to Houston, Texas. Inez married John W. Stocton of Bryan and moved to Austin, Texas. Irene married Floy L. Saxon of Reliance and moved to Hearne, Texas. Henry married Vacielle Wright of Bryan still lived in community. Morris married Jana Moore in the same neighborhood. They lived nineteen years in the home of John and Tillie Moore.

There nine grandchildren and nineteen great-grandchildren.

Aubrey -- one son -- one daughter -- five grandchildren

Inez -- one son -- four grandchildren

Irene -- one son -- one daughter -- three grandchildren

Henry -- one daughter

Janice Sue Moore married Jerry Wayne Jones of Texarkana, Arkansas on November 26,

1973 with Rev. Barnett doing the honors.

John and Tillie are now deceased and both laid to rest in Alexander Cemetery. Tillie passed away at the age of 80 years and seven months on October 11, 1959.

As I write this many many fond memories of those rinateen years spent when Papa John and Mama Moore come back. They were wonderful to me and I loved them for it. I think we made a record of time never any hard or bad feelings were ever between us. This proves that two families can live under one roof if they try. Maybe my nickname made a difference. I was known as the "Outlaw" in the Moore family. This was given to me by Tillman the eldest of the six children, now deceased, five years ago April, 1969.

lived on his land but chose to stay in Brazos county. George McMillan married Ann Jane Young April 5, 1855. To this union five children were born. Alice married W.H. (Bud) Walker, April 1, 1877. Mary Ann married George Wicker December 23, 1880. Betty married Charner Skains he died and she later married Thomas Skains. Emma died at 5 years of age. William andrew married Maggie McMordie. George Mc Millan's first wife died and he later married Maggie Nichol May 4, 1871 to them was born one child Margaret Jane (Maggie) June 6, 1875 who later became Mrs. Horace Holden. Margaret's mother died when she was 7 months old. Mrs Tom Fullerton who lived in the Alexander Community and was a niece of George McMillan's. She took the baby to raise. Mrs. Fullerton then deeded 50 acres of land to George McMillan so that he could be near the baby. George McMillan devoted much of his later life making trips to Galveston and New Orleans to get articles for neighbors. He died May 21, 1884.

The McWhorter Family:

Ned McWhorter born 1882, died 1960. He came to this area from Grimes County. His first wife was Chappel. Ned's sister Addie also married a Chappel. The Chappel father is buried in Alexander Cemetery. Ned later married Elizabeth McWhorter. Ned and two sons Noah born 1903 died 1969 married Bessie McWhorter. Charlie born 1905 died 1950 are buried in Alexander cemetery. Also a daughter-in-law Margie McWhorter wife of John G. McWhorter born 1900 died 1969.

The Roland Crenshaw Family:

Roland Crenshaw born 1887 died 1966 was the son of Joe and Nellie Crenshaw. They lived near Wesson Church for sometime, then at Tabor for a few years. Roland married Lillian Elliott. The Crenshaws had three daughters Etna who married Arch Robinson. She is still a member of Alexander Church. Jessie married Rufus Batten. Irma is deceased.

The Tom Martin Family:

Mr. & Mrs. Tom Martin lived at Alexander in early days. Their children were: Will S. who married Lula Hall, Tom Jr., Henry married Clara Gallaton, Lillie married Charlie Holden. Maggie married Pee Holden. Will Martin was born 1858 died 1832, wife Lula Hall was born in 1865 died in 1907. Their children: Clifford, Robert, Oscar born 1889 died 1918. Nellie. married Paul Dansby. Will, Lula and son Oscar are the only members of the family turied at Alexander.

E. O. Hall Brother of Lula Martin was bo-rn in Crenshaw County, Alabama in 1856 died 1879. He is also buried on the Martin plot.

The Claud Martin Family:

Claud Martin born 1901 died 1957.

The John Hensik Family:

Born 1820 died 1961. He and wife purchased the Walter Armstrong place at Tabor.

The Moore Family:

John Marion Moore, son of Anthony and Elizabeth Black Moore natives of Alabama, was born in Montgomery Alabama on December 6, 1875. The Moore's moved from Alabama to Texas in 1880 settling at Kurten. John was five when they moved. There was a younger son, Huel two years, that died the next year and was buried at Kurten in Ebeneza Cemetery. At this time the Moore's were members of Ebeneza Free Will Baptist Church. They lived in this community until their deaths and are buried in Bryan City Cemetery.

"Papa John" was a wonderful person and never lost faith in human nature and it strengthen after he was blind. I remember so well our evenings reading and discussing the Bible. We enjoyed this so, for he missed being able to read. There were times when I could not read to him and Frances would read and she enjoyed being able to read and do for him because he appreciated everything so much.

Mama Moore was a person who was happy when she was busy in her yard and among her flowers. She was talented in the way of being able to keep everyone around busy and staying equally busy. She was wonderful and very patient. She also appreciated everything you did for her.

My memories are too many to write about, but those two people were wonderful.

The Moss Family:

William Moss born 1833 in South Carolina died 1897 in Brazos County. He married Mary Horton Moss born 1838 and died 1920. They had two children Steve Moss, born 1889 died 1914, never married. Anna born 1857 died 1905 married Robert J. Nichol. Mr. and Mrs. Moss lived for many years on the "cut off" road between the Wheelock road and Tabor, near the Ed Elliott place.
All of the named above are buried at Alexander.

The Nichol Family:

John Nichol born 1803 died 1877. Jane Nichol born 1808 died 1885. They came to America from Scotland. It was not known whether they ever lived near Alexander or not, but their son Robert John Nichol married Anna Moss who did live there. Robert John Nichol was born 1850 died 1896. Anna Moss Nichol born 1857 died 1905. Children of Anna and Bob (R.J.) Nichol are Maude born 1883 died 1913. Ella married Ollie Emmel. Mae married Rudolph Myers. Robbie married Morris Tatum. John William Nichol born 1875 died 1934. George Hartwell Nichol born 1897 died 1946. All of the deceased above are buried at Alexander.

The W. W. Parker Family:

One of the very early families of Alexander was William and Frances Parker. They owned land back of the cemetery. Their children attended school at Alexander. Hattie married, John Nash. James married Nora Thomas. Dochie married John Glover. Eddie and Harry died yound and are buried in Alexander Cemetery.

The Parker Family:

James J. Parker born 1867 died 1949. Armanda Parker born 1871 died 1964. Children: J. Walter Parker born 1892 died 1919, John Dale Parker born 1905. Annie Lou Parker (daughter-in-law) born 1896 died 1968. Near the Parker plot are buried two son-in-laws, John Cloud husband of Mae Parker Cloud, Sam Graham husband of Della Parker Graham.

The William L. Powers and wife M. B. Brogdon Family:

Their children Willie maried A. Scott, Maude married Ed Royal, Bessie born 1889 died 1971 married Dees, Norman born 1879 died 1880.

The Presnal Family:

Rhode Presnal, mother of J. K. Presnal, is the first generation of Presnals to be buried here.

J. K. Presnal and his wife, the former Mollie Hudspeth Chatham, represent the second generation buried here. Mollie's father, Robert H. Hudspeth, and first husband, Tillman Chatham, are also buried at Alexander. Tillman Chatham died leaving Mollie a widow with a small child, Tillie, who married John M. Moore and is buried in \lexander

Three sons of J. K. and Mollie, Charles, Earl, and Bobby, represent the third generation of Presnals to be buried at Alexander. Bobby died as an infant and was buried before a family plot was established. Both Charles' and Earl's first wives are also buried in the family plot.

Fourth and fifth generations of Presnals are the children and grandchildren of Will Presnal, Laura Holden and Mary Kern. Will resides in the Tabor community while Laura and Mary were both interred in the Broam City Cemetery.

J. K. Presnal and his widowed mother moved into the community about the time of the Civil War and moved their church membership to Alexander about 1900 when the Wesson Methodist Church was disbanded.

The D. S. Purcell Family:

Mr. Purcell was born in 1832 died 1899. He came to the Alexander community from the state of Kentucky. He married Addie Boggs born 1832 and died 1899. They lived for many years on the William Lawrence place after Mr. Lawrence died. Mrs. Purcell and daughters sold the place to John Wilcox soon after Mr. Purcell died. They moved to Ford County. Lettie married Ike Venoy of College Station. Mrs. Purcell's body was returned to Alexander for internment.

The Roberts Family:

Mary E. Roberts born 1909 died 1966.

The Singletary Family:

Carl C. Singletary born 1893 died 1958. William A. Singletary born 1865 died 1916. Bettie Singletary born 1872 died 1916.

The Skains Family:

H. P. Skains born 1847 died 1886. E. G. Skains born 1822 died 1878. Nothing is known about these persons.

There was another Skains family who lived near Wesson or Wixson. They were Dick, Will, Fannie and Selman. Whether there was a connection here is not known. Other skains buried in Alexander cemetery are: Irene Mae Skains born 1863 died 1893; Oscar Skains born 1882 died 1884.

The Srimpton Family:

Carrie Srimpton born 1892 died 1973. James (Jim) Srimpton born 1898 died 1960.

The Stallings Family:

Nicholas Stallings, a teen-ager, arrived in James City County, Virginia, in November 1635 from London, England. He had 3 sons, Nicholas, Jr., John and Elias. Those coming to Texas later were the decendents of Elias. William Danial Stallings, Jr., lived in Butler Co., Alabama, married Louise H. Wilson, died during the civil war. They had 3 children. Louise, (known as Eliza) then married James Brogdon and came to Texas. William D. Stallings III, (known as Bill or Billy) was borned in Butler Co., Alabama in 1860, came to Texas as a young child. In 1884 married Emma Elizabeth Josey, also borned in Butler Co., Alabama in 1863. They settled in the Cameron Ranch area, where they farmed and ranched. In November 1974 the Stallings family will have been in this country 340 years. They had 5 sons and 2 daughters.

The Children of Billy and Emma: Jack, William, Bessie, Robert, Henry, Arch, Leona, all attended school at Alexander. Bessie later taught school at Alexander. Henry married Pearl Drumond. Bessie married Herman Benkie. Leona married William Van Grunorth

J. H. Thompson was born January 12, 1823, died May 17, 1886.

He was a brother to E. W. Thompson but came to the Alexander area much later. They were orphaned at avery early age, lived in different home, had not seen each other for years, when, one day J. H. drove us to E. W.'s home in a covered wagon from Mississippi with a beautiful red headed wife.

This John Thompson settled permanently at Wheelock. His children were: Eugenia, Ada, Blanch, Laura and John Adams born 1879 died 1955. Most of the girls moved to California. After John H. Thompson died his wife Fannie Montgomery married James V. Walker, no realtion to any of the other Walker's. James V. Walker was born 1855 died 1940.

John H. Thompson, two infants, John A. Thompson and Jas. V. Walker are all buried at Alexander. Fannie Walker went to live with daughters in California.

John Adams Thompson's wife Phanata born 1886 died 1973 is also buried in Alexander Cemetery.

The Toomer Family:

John Toomer born 1893 died 1961. His wife Millie Toomer born 1897 died 1960.

The Walker Family:

James Walker an Irishman and an early settler of Alexander Community, Brazos County, was born September 2, 1817 and died May 18, 1874. He was one of the trustees of the first church at Alexander. The deeds of the church property show that James Walker owned land adjoining the church land. It is not known at this time if James Walker had a family.

John William Walker was born April 26, 1893 in Irland and died June 2, 1920. He married Mary Jane Wallace who was a sister to John Wallace another of the first trustees. Mary Jane was born in Mississippi February 11, 1834 and died March 22, 1920.

Their children were: Mary Isabella (Bell) who married Ezra Wilson, Tom married Mary Wilson, Joe Bennett married Lou Wilson, Jimmy died in infancy. After Mary Jane's death Mr. Walker married Isabella Fullerton born in South Carolina in 1823. Isabella died before 1850 leaving her husband and two children Elizabeth (Bettie) who married Joe Berry. William (Bud) married Alice McMillan. They had one son Claude Walker who died in 1965. All of the above are buried at Alexander except Claude Walker, William Walker and Isabella Fullerton Walker.

1. Joe Bennett Walker was born May 16, 1866, in Brazos County, died November 8, 1922, (buried in Alexander Cemetery). On November 26, 1890, he married Dora Wilson, born October 9, 1871, in Alabama, died February 15, 1933 (Buried in Alexander Cemetery). Born to Joe B. and Dora Walker were eleven children, five daughters and six sons—Myrtie, born October 17, 1891, died November 30, 1894, (buried in Alexander Cemetery); Una Mae, born August 26, 1893,; William John (Bill), born July 15, 1896, died June 22, 1971, (buried in Alexander Cemetery, married the former Ella Mae Stewart; Clarence Edward (Dock), born May 9, 1898, died July 24, 1969, (buried in Alexander Cemetery); Ruby, born December 17, 1899, died August 17, 1956, (buried in Alexander Cemetery), married to Tom Heflin; Roy Herbert, born November 6, 1901, died December 27, 1956, (buried in Alexander Cemetery), married to the former Ruby Jean Steward; Sherman Sidney, born August 25, 1903, died February 9, 1973, (buried in Navasota Cemetery), married to the former Vivian Pool; Bertha Irene, born June 30, 1905, married to Fred W. Locke, two daughters—Jo Ann and Jean married to Dayton MosesIII, three children—Michele Ann, Melinda Sue, and Michael Dayton; Joe Bailey, born June 16, 1907,; Pauline, born August 6, 1910, married to John Brooks Thompson, two sors—Joe Brooks married to the former

Charlotte Craig and Neal Truett married to the former Sue Sellers, two sons--Chip and James Brooks; Woodrow Wilson, born June 13, 1912, married to the former Ollie Mae Carter, three sons--Wilson, Lynn married to the former Bonnie Davis, one son--Craig, Glynn married to the former Royce Ann Walker, one son--Kyle Bennett.

- 2. George Walker born 1862 died 1942 married Lou Wilson born 1873 died 1933. Their children: John married Abbie Walker. Pearl never married, Ernest married Mary Malesky, Fannie married Will Gandy, Katie married Oscar Gregg, Maude married Henry Richardson, Betty married Henry Barnes, Sam married Evelyn Ball, Paul not married.
- 3. Tom Walker born 1860 died 1947 married Mary Walker 1869 died 1960. Their children : Eddie born December 8, 1903 died January 11, 1925. Marie not married.
- 4. Mary Isabella (Bell) married Egra Wilson. Their children: Minnie married Edgar Maniord, Jim never married, Verna married Nat Harrison, Tom married Louella Holiday, Ollie did not marry, Bessie married Noah McWhorter, Ray married Charley McWhorter, Oscar married (Rushia) Lanora Cooper. Ella died in childhood.
- 5. Jimmy died in infancy.

The Mark Wilcox Family:

Mark Willcox and his wife Elizabeth Cravey Willcox came to Smith County Texas from Abbieville, Willcox County, Georga in about 1855. They moved to Red Top, near what is now Benchley, in 1865 or 1866 after the Civil War. Mark served in the Civil War.

To this union was born Walter M, Thomas M., Oscar L., John H., Minnie, Ida and Abbie .

Walter M. married Sally Lee and they and 10 children; Oscar L. married Canerey Peters and had 5 children; John H. married Esther Reynolds and they had 6 children. Thomas, Minnie, Ida and Abbie wer never married due to early deaths.

Mark, Elizabeth and children Minnie, Ida, and Abbie are buried in Smith County. Oscar and wife; John and wife are buried in the Bryan Cemetery. Walter and wife Sally; Oliver, son of Walter, and Roy, son of Oliver, are buried here in the Alexander Cemetery.

Mark Willcox had the name legally changed to Wilcox after he came to Texas. However his daughter Abbie's grave marker in the Seal's Cemetery reflects the old spelling.

A number of Mark's decendents still reside in Brazos County.

Note from Mark Wilcox's diary of January 1, 1857 "Not feeling too well today. Danced too late and had too much to drink last night. Had Vinson, blackeyed peas, sweet potatoes and greens for dinner today."

The H. Lafayette Wilson Family:

Thompson died his wife Fannie Montgomery married James V. Walker, no realtion to any of the other Walker's. James V. Walker was born 1855 died 1940.

John H. Thompson, two infants, John A. Thompson and Jas. V. Walker are all buried at Alexander. Fannie Walker went to live with daughters in California.

John Adams Thompson's wife Phanata born 1886 died 1973 is also buried in Alexander Cemetery.

The Walker Family:

James Walker an Irishman and an early settler of Alexander Community, Brazos County, was born September 2, 1817 and died May 18, 1874. He was one of the trustees of the first church at Alexander. The deeds of the church property show that James Walker owned land adjoining the church land. It is not known at this time if James Walker had a family.

John William Walker was born April 26, 1893 in Irland and died June 2, 1920. He married Mary Jane Wallace who was a sister to John Wallace another of the first trustees. Mary Jane was born in Mississippi February 11, 1834 and died March 22, 1920.

Their children were: Mary Isabella (Bell) who married Ezra Wilson, Tom married Mary Wilson, Joe Bennett married Lou Wilson, Jimmy died in infancy. After Mary Jane's death Mr. Walker married Isabella Fullerton born in South Carolina in 1823. Isabella died before 1850 leaving her husband and two children Elizabeth (Bettie) who married Joe Berry. William (Bud) married Alice McMillan. They had one son Claude Walker who died in 1965. All of the above are buried at Alexander except Claude Walker, William Walker and Isabella Fullerton Walker.

- 7. Gertrude died in early adulthood did not marry.
- 8. Bertha (Bertie) married John Glover.
- 9. Fannie married George Maniord.
- 10. Lillie never married.
- 11. Flanch did not marry.

The William Worsham Family:

William Worsham born in 1840 came to this area from near Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He married Tennessee Rojhelia. She was the first school teacher in Roans Praire near Pichards, Texas. Their children: Henry, Jeff, Jinmy, Buyon. Julia, married a Mr. Yeager of Grimes County. Hallie married Tom Daves also of Grimes County.

William Henry Worsham married Maranda Blum. Their children: Walter, Ruble, Leah, Plumer, Luster, Russell and Albert. Maranda died and he later married her sister Fannie Blum Goodman who was a widow. Their children: Frank, Tennie, Dee, Bessie, Houston, Woodrow, Allen and Dorothy. Fannie was born Hovember 9, 1875. She will be one hundred years of age Movember 9 of this year. Henry was born 1865 and died 1824 and is buried at Alexander.

The Winters FAmily:

Candance Winters born 1947 died 1957. The daughter of Johnnie and Wanda Winters and the Grandaughter of Mrs. Mae Cloud.

Note-- (It is noted that Robertson county was formed between the Brazos and Navasota Rivers in about 1836, later it was sub-divided into several smaller counties. In 1841 Navasota County was formed from Robertson Co. and Wilson Co., in 1842 Navasota County was re-named BRAZOS County.

Note #2 -- Brogdon---James Erogdon married Louise H. (Wilson) Stallings after her husband, William D. Stallings, Jr. died and moved to Robertson Co. Texas. With them William D. Stallings III and 2 other children. The Brogdons had 4 children, John, Reuben, (father of Aline Brogdon) Betty and Bob. Bettie married Harve Henry, Reuben married Daisy Montgomery.

The Elijah Weathersby Thompson Family:

Born 1831 died 1901. He came to the Alexander Community as a young man from Mississippi. He married Jessie Nichol who live! only a short time. He later married Margaret Drew McCallum of Leon County born 1844 died 1923.

Being a carpenter and blacksmith well as stockman and farmer. He made wagons to sell. This his greatest profit, he purchased land with the income. At the time of his death he owned 300 acres a short distance from the location of the church and cemetery.

He put his talent as a carpenter into use by helping to build the first church. He continued to support the church throughout his lire. He and his wife opened their home sometime for ten days at a time to ministers.

To this union was born four boys and four girls. The oldest daughter Margaret died in infancy. William E. born 1372 died 1927 married Katherine (Kate) born 1868 died 1945. John W. born 1874 died 1953 married Eva Boggs born 1884 died 1957. Elijah W. Jr. married Maggie Holden. This couple is buried in Bryan City Cemetery. Marvin E. born 1882 and died 1945 married Annie McCallum born 1885 died 1956. Eula married Elbert Moore. This couple buried in Edge Cemetery. Mattie married Arch McCallum born 1863 died 1900. After his death she married E. C. Rollins one of the early school teachers. This couple is buried in the Kirbyville Cemetery, Jasper County. Mae born 1835 married George F. Lenry born 1882 died 1920. Mae is the only survivor of this family.

Elijah W. Thompson, two wives and four children and several grandchildren are buried in the Alexander Cemetery.

The John T. Leathers Family:

John Leathers was born 1348 died 1925, his wife Donie born 1844 died 1916. To this union was born four children. Mary married Sam Seale of Benchley, Texas, Maud married Tom Elliott of Edge, Texas, Alice married Frank Wallace of Edge, Texas, Frank the son died before reaching manhood. Mrs. Leathers was a devout christian and good shouting Methodist of Alexander. Mrs. Leathers and son Frank are buried at Alexander.

The Wager Family:

Leroy Wager born 1932 died 1069. M. A. Thompson born 1923 died 1964, Willis Thompson born 1394 died 1957. W.S. Thompson born 1394 died 1967.
